SCHOOL, DIVISIONAL and REGIONAL STUDENT SUPPORT SERVICES

Paul Rowe offers a number of support services directly, through Peace River School Division and through referrals to community and regional organizations. Some of these supports are:

PAUL ROWE STUDENT SUPPORT WORKER

Our Student Support Worker (SSW) provides universal programming in the areas of mental health, addictions, and social/emotional learning. This is achieved mainly through full-class and small group activities which promote positive mental health for our students, staff and families.

PRSD SOCIAL WORKER

Our SSW can also assist with referrals to our PRSD Social Worker Travis and emotional support dog Murphy.

PAUL ROWE INCLUSIVE EDUCATION COACHES

Some students may benefit from extra academic, behaviour or social/emotional supports. Through meetings with the student and parents, our school I-Coaches can coordinate supports for our students.

Our I-Coaches can also connect students to external mental health supports, **Peace Collaborative Services** (psychology services, occupational and physical therapy, speech language supports, vision, deaf and hard of hearing supports), etc.

MANNING & REGION RESOURCES

We can provide information for Peace Region Family Resource Network and assist with referrals to the Family Resilience Program. Also ask about the Empowering Kids and Youth Program which provides mentorship to youth to speak about family violence, conflict and trauma.

We also work with **Community Actions for Health and Well Being** and can provide information for the **Resource Centre for Suicide Prevention.**

ATTENDANCE MATTERS



Following the Pandemic years, the Peace River School Division continues to see significant numbers of students absent every day. Between the start of the current school year and the middle of January, our data shows approximately 17% of our students do not attend school on Fridays and between 11% and 14% are absent Monday through Thursday.

The same data shows that 48.5% of our students attend school less than 90% of the time. Why do we consider this a challenge? Because at the Peace River School Division, we know that "Learning Starts when Students Show Up." We also know that attendance is deeply personal, and the reasons why students miss school are unique and sometimes complex.

PAKISIWIN HAND GAMES



Hand games are a traditional Dene game. There are many different variations, however, the following guidelines have been generously shared with us by Elder Herman Sutherland from Whitefish Lake First Nation.

Pointing Left



Pointing Right

Basic Shots





All players show their left hand

Thumb Up

All players left

of the thumb

show their left

(outside) hand;

players the right

of the thumb

show right

(outside) their

hand



Thumb Up Pointing Left Pointing Right



All players right of the thumb show their right (outside) hand; players the left of the thumb show their left (outside) hand

Butterfly



either side of the thumbs show their other players show their outside hands

The 2 players on either end show their outside hand, all other players show their inside hand

Reverse

Butterfly

Knife Cut



All players left of the cut show their right (inside) hand; players the right of the cut show their left (inside) hand

Guidelines

- Each team consists of 10 people [8 players, 1 alternate, and, optionally, one drummer]
- minutes (whichever comes first).
- Teams will take turns 'guessing' and 'hiding'
- A coin toss will determine which team 'hides' first. This team will also receive 1
- The 'hiding' team will put their hands behind their backs and bring out their fists with a rock hidden in one of them.
- The 'guessing' team will have one designated guesser (shooter) who will give the hand signal (shot) instructing players on the hiding team which hand is being
- Once the shot is played, all 'hiders' must expose their hands.
 - If the shooter guessed correctly the the mat in front of them.
 - If the shooter guessed incorrectly (the empty hand) the hider will wave their hand indicating that they were not caught. The hiding team will receive 1 stick for every successful hider.
- The round will continue until all 'hiders' are out. At which time, the guessing team becomes the hiders.
- The game continues until all 17 sticks are won by a single team.
